BT Goal #1

"We have fostered a broader acceptance of unity in diversity and the mutuality of the Carmelite family, especially by continued collaboration and communion among associations/federations at home and abroad."

Cor orans was promulgated on May 15, 2018, one month after our General
Assembly that year. This has led to frequent communication and sharing not only
with membership of CCA but also with International and US Associations.



Each time presentations were given on Cor orans throughout the world, sisters from other associations/federations generously shared copies and translations of these talks, sometimes hiring a professional translator, as did CCA with the talk of Fr. Saverio to the Mexican Federation. Our history of connectedness with our US and International sisters truly laid the groundwork for our continuing cooperation and collaboration.



The LT has collaborated on various topics with our sisters from the UK and Germany. We have been in touch via e-mails, ZOOMS and phone conversations regarding the requirements of Cor orans and how to implement them, particularly with regard to updating our statutes. We also look forward to future collaboration with our sisters in France whose new President has been in contact with us.



It might surprise you to see that we are including the Ghent gathering in our report. Although this meeting planned for May 2020 was not realized due to the worldwide Covid-19 crisis, we felt that its planning process was one of the most significant expressions of our collaboration with our national and international sisters in this term. The planning meetings offered an opportunity to work closely with other associations and federations for the purpose of international collaboration.

The Ghent Gathering was first conceived at the CCA pre-meeting in April 2018. The idea was proposed to celebrate the 400 years since the establishment of the first English speaking Carmel. Sr. Lucia and Fr. Benedict representing the Netherlands Federation suggested a trip to Ghent so that we could visit historical sites. The first English speaking Carmel was established in Antwerp (1618); later in Lierre (1648) and in Hoogstraten (1678).

A planning committee was formed and consisted of Sr. Shelagh of the UK association, Sr. Mary Clare of MQC, Srs. BT and Monika of CCA and Sr. Lucia and Fr. Benedict representing the Netherlands Fed. Sr. Clare Joseph of Terre Haute for the most part was secretary for our meetings. The committee met 10 times by zoom in the course of almost 2 years.



We chose 3 noted presenters for the meeting;

- Sr. Connie on history
- Fr. Saverio on formation and the future of Carmel
- Dr. Rowan Williams on the continuing relevance of Carmel in our world today.



29 participants representing the leadership councils of these English speaking associations and federations signed up to participate: CCA, Mary Queen of Carmel, St. Teresa, the UK, the Netherlands, Australia, Ireland and English speaking Africa.





We established the following as our goals and desired outcomes for the gathering:

- · To strengthen friendships and collaboration,
- To consider common issues affecting our life and identify ways to address them, specifically: Cor orans, Learnings from History, initial and ongoing formation, forming Formators, and the International Commission that was to be established to collaborate with the friars on the topic of formation,
- · To explore new ways of living out our Carmelite Charism,
- To establish a commitment to foster communion among us.

Despite the disappointment of not actually having the meeting, there were positive outcomes to all the planning. Certainly the closer bonds we have established with the planning committee members and their associations will continue to advance our goal of communion and further collaboration in the future.

Sisters Bernadette Therese and Monika had the privilege of representing CCA at the
50th Anniversary celebration of the Mexican Federation. This celebration took
place from late September to October 1, 2018 at a beautiful retreat center in San
Juan de los Lagos.



The main speakers at the celebration were Fr. Saverio and Fr. Rafal. Their talks focused mainly on Cor orans and its implications for the sisters. Other guest speakers were Sister Edith de Jesús, the President of the Peruvian Federation, Father Javier Mena, the Definitor for Latin America, and Father Juan Pablo, the religious Assistant for Mexico.





This came about as a result of an invitation from the 3 provinces of our friars who had a joint provincial council meeting and wanted to use this as an opportunity to include the nuns on various topics.

Prior to the meeting with the Friars, the nuns from Mary Queen of Carmel and CCA had a chance to discuss and share our common interests in the areas of

- formation for Formators,
- exploring resources together for initial/ongoing formation,
- developing mutual support between nuns and friars,
- updating Statutes according to Cor orans, etc.


We agreed on a joint Meeting of Carmelite Nuns and Friars in 2021. We discussed the following:

- Continuing the project to update and revise Carmelite Liturgical Books;

In a spirit of communion, CCA accepted the invitation to Queen of Carmel's formation workshop at Redlands. Srs. Celia and Colette from Baltimore Carmel were delighted to represent CCA at that meeting.



Last October, Sr. Bernadette Therese and Sr. Margie also participated in Queen of Carmel's leadership formation workshop which featured Benedictine Fr. Eugene Hensell who spoke on leading an organization and Fr. Rafal who spoke on various aspects of Cor orans and its impact on our lives. It was also an opportunity to meet with Fr. Rafal to clarify canonical issues pertaining to affiliations.




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CCA is always ready to share our resources with other associations. Sr. BT responded to an inquiry from St. Teresa's Association about the process of incorporation. She connected with Sr. Colette who graciously agreed to host a zoom to explain this process. It was participated in by members of the council of St. Teresa's association and several sisters of St. Joseph's association. At the Redlands formation workshop, Sr. Colette led a similar meeting to provide guidance to the council of MQC on incorporating an association.



Reciprocally, Mother Anne of Terre Haute came to the aid of CCA when our Cleveland sisters needed help with their move to the new monastery. She responded with a resounding "yes" to Sr. Bernadette Therese's request on behalf of Cleveland. The work of Mother Anne and 3 novices was greatly appreciated. It was also a wonderful opportunity for joyous sisterly sharing.

At the end of November 2018, the coordinators of all 4 US associations met via zoom to discuss the new requirement of Cor orans of the religious assistant and to share perspectives. They also discussed the possibility of collaborating on a formator's program with the friars. At the invitation of Sr. BT, a second zoom meeting of the coordinators was held on August 2019.



Goal #2


"We have continued to work at achieving a representative voice in matters affecting our lives, the Teresian charism and the Order."



One of the more significant themes that your Leadership team has had to work on on behalf of CCA during this term was the revision of our Statutes. With the promulgation of Cor orans came the necessity of reviewing our present Statutes and beginning the process of updating them in such a way that we keep the spirit of CCA while respecting the place of juridical norms.

ROZ Early on Sister Bernadette Therese contacted the US Association Presidents about how they were approaching updating their statutes and what we might be able to do together, especially in those areas that related to our Carmelite heritage and Constitutions. The other three Association Presidents expressed their preference to work separately. Internationally the UK Association freely shared drafts of their statutes and exchanged perspectives with us about their process. The German Federation were likewise generous in sharing ideas with us and we with them.

MONIKA We have listened to and followed up on comments and suggestions that our CCA members gave us after receiving the first and second drafts of updating our Statutes, including expanding our consultations so that our Final Revision may truly reflect membership input and the best advice the Leadership Team has received.



Because of the intricacies of juridical language, we have found it necessary to secure the services of Nancy Reynolds, a canon lawyer who has specialized in religious canon law as we began the work of drafting updates of our Statutes.

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
We have also communicated regularly with Fr. Rafal, Secretary for the Nuns and communicated with both Fr. Saverio and the Procurator General, Fr. Jean Joseph. These regular communications with representatives of our Generalate have been valuable in making our voice and concerns known in the Order.

We turn now to Goal #3

"We have developed and empowered our members to be future leaders of and/or contributors to CCA."



One of the most significant ways we as a leadership team sought to develop and empower our members to be future leaders and contributors to CCA was through our ongoing formation program, Women at the Well *Dialogues*. Women at the Well *Dialogues* was our response to Father General's strong encouragement to develop leadership among the nuns and the emphasis in Cor orans that associations initiate ongoing formation programs to benefit all the nuns of its member communities.

Beginning in 2016, the previous LT started developing a leadership formation program. Despite the fact that the project did not come to completion, they believed and hoped that their hard work of planting a seed would bear fruit in a renewed form in the future. They saw great potential in the initiatives of our newer members. Sure enough, an inquiry from Sr. Agnes of our newer members group was the impetus for Sr. Bernadette Therese to begin a conversation with Elizabeth McCabe which led to the planning of Women at the Well *Dialogue* and its execution. Thank you Sisters, your work was never in vain.



From the very beginning, a clearly articulated goal of Women at the Well *Dialogues* was to encourage and enable our sisters to lead and to be contributors. Thus our initial theme on Leadership and how to promote authentic collegiality in community using skills of personal and communal discernment. This program was designed to utilize a pedagogy that encourages personal and communal reflection with emphasis on dialogue and discussion, pulling wisdom and insight from members rather than relying too heavily on resource persons.





Our visits were experienced by both the communities and the sisterly visitors as a time of deeper bonding and sharing among sisters.


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

More than ever CCA communities need the prayerful and loving support of each other.



Modeled after the Wisconsin Religious Shared Services Collaborative, the CCA version first involved obtaining a grant to fund the project.

CIE Thanks to the work of Stephanie and Sr. Bernadette Therese, CCA was awarded a grant of \$80,000 from the GHR Foundation. The relationship with this Foundation was a huge breakthrough for us. To do the necessary research and planning Kate Asselin was hired as our project manager.

MONIKA We are grateful for Kate's competence in planning the program. We hope that the collaborative will forge a new way that we, as member Carmels of CCA, can work together as we face our future. Sr. Bernadette Therese along with Stephanie have also been invited to a conversation with GHR for further funding for the plan's implementation phase.


