Our hearts and our prayers go out to their communities and families. They are surely part of the spring of living water that is Carmel.

During this year of the Teresian celebrations, we encourage you to consult the official website sponsored by the Discalced Carmelite Order in the United States for the 5th Centenary: www.teresa-5th-centenary.org. There you will find a calendar of events, commemorative items, and pictures, many of which can be downloaded.

Death of Sr. Ann

Our last contribution to the CCA newsletter informed you of a fall our Sr. Ann Sheridan had which sent her to the hospital for surgery and then to St. Anne's Home in Greensburg for recuperation. Since then we have sent by email, to the members of ocdnorthamerica, the account of her last days with us on earth. Sr. Ann was dearly loved by many loyal friends from Pittsburgh who attended her funeral, some of whom were companions from

her grade school/high school days. We had the joy of having two of our Carmelite Friars with us for the celebration of the Eucharist at her funeral: Fr. Jude Peters, OCD, our Provincial and Fr. Adam Gregory Gonzoles, OCD from the California Province who was here giving our community retreat at the time. We were happy to have our Sisters from the Baltimore Carmel represented by Sr. Robin and Sr. Luisa. Ann is buried on our grounds next to the four other Sisters who preceded her in death. Later Sisters Tanya and Mary Paul dug the hole and cemented the simple wooden Cross at her grave which will have Ann's name plate added to the cross-bar.

Remodeling

Several areas in our monastery required remodeling so we invested in new windows where needed and new flooring in our recreation room, the Sacristy and two adjacent rooms. What a beautiful "feel" there is in our recreation room with a lovely wood-pattern floor.

Retreat

As is our custom we have, for our annual community retreat, one week in silence and one week with a retreat master. This year we appreciated the talks by Fr. Adam Gregory Gonzoles, OCD. His stay overlapped with Ann's funeral and the following day of celebration with our Secular Carmelites; so for three days we had two Carmelite celebrants at our daily Eucharist.

Honoring Our Holy Mother Teresa in this year of grace, we invited our Latrobe Secular Carmelites to join us in a day of celebration, November 9th. Fr. Marc Foley, OCD, was asked to give two conferences that day which focused on understanding Holy Mother Teresa through her life and works. We shared lunch together and delighted in conversing with our growing Secular Carmelite community.

Christmas

For our Christmas celebration this year, we decided to move the midnight Mass to an earlier hour, 9:00 p.m. Preceding this, we had our usual procession throughout the house singing carols with our Prioress, Sr. Mary carrying the statue of the Infant Jesus. When we reached the Chapel, we heard the proclamation of the birth of Jesus sung by Sr. Marie Elizabeth this year. We prayed Office of Readings then sang some carols before the Eucharistic celebration. Many of our friends appreciated this earlier Mass as much as we did.

In early January Ruth went up to University Hospital in Indianapolis to

We will soon send out an account of Ruth's life. We want to thank all of our dear Sisters for such a quick and loving response to the news of her death. We appreciate all the email messages, cards, phone calls, and the prayers and masses promised through them.

Amid the cold of winter, new life still comes forth. In mid-December, our Sister Ann Marie entered into the fullness of life, peacefully and, to us, unexpectedly. On Dec. 12^{th} , she was taken to the hospital emergency room and admitted to the intensive care unit. Days earlier there had been no significant signs of illness, nor acute pain, so this was a surprise to us. Extensive surgery followed, revealing sepsis; and multiple organs began to fail. In mid-afternoon of Dec. 13^{th} , she breathed her last with Sr. Patricia and our

cemetery of All Saints. Sr. Aletha braved the winter weather and came for the Mass, making the round trip from and to Beacon in one day; we were so grateful for this generosity! Our Community has many happy memories of Sister Ann Marie: her devotion to the Sacred Heart, her acceptance of the limitations brought on by aging and her keen humor and many more.

On the solemnity of the Epiphany, our Kings' Cake gave us St. Teresa of Jesus as patron for the year. We were surprised and delighted, another gift for us during her 5^{th} centenary of birth.

Sr. Anna's birthday and Sr. Anne's birthday occurred within six days of each other: January 30th and February 4th. Of course, there were two parties! Our friends in the women's Cursillo group of St. Joseph Church in Danville provided the cake/ice cream. Both Sisters are doing well at ages 88 and 91, respectively.

A staff writer for our diocesan newspaper, "The Catholic Witness", contacted us, asking what we are planning for the celebration of this Year of Consecrated Life. And, so we share with you, too. We began reading and reflecting on the Rule in Community and will begin the Constitutions this month, refreshing in our minds and internalizing more the points of these bases of our life. During Lent we will share together on the Gospels of the

Lenten Sundays. We have also begun a 24 part DVD course on the Old Testament by Amy-Jill Levine of Vanderbilt University; this has proven to be a wonderful "find". There is a similar 24 part DVD course on the New Testament, which we will eventually view together. The Sisters of SS. Cyril and Methodius have invited us to a monthly video lecture, in house, on themes of consecrated life. These are applicable to apostolic and contemplative religious.

Greetings to all of you, Sisters, from snowy New Hampshire. As I write, I am reminded of the wrath of the Goddess Juno in the *Aeneid* because Blizzard Juno is pouring down snow; it is a good morning to compose. Now that we have returned to Ordinary Time, we are busy planning events and discussions for 2015. In this edition of our Newsletter, though, I will share with you the highlights of our activities and some of our reflections during the final four months of 2014.

Beginning September 21, Fr. Tom Frink, S.J. gave us a retreat on Mission. He shared deeply from his study of St. John of the Cross, to whom he has a special devotion, and from the thought of his own St. Ignatius of Loyola. At the beginning he told us that he wanted to spark the fires of our Carmelite commitment and increase our understanding of our own mission in the church. In these aims he truly succeeded, and we are grateful to him and to the Lord.

This fall we devoted some community meetings to discussion of the questionnaire sent out by the committee of CICLSAL charged with producing a new document on contemplative nuns (to replace *Sponsa Verbi*, 1999). It was good for us to reflect on enclosure, initial and ongoing formation, and autonomy; we are still discussing these issues now as we plan for the future. Beyond our own efforts, however, lay the reward of reading the responses of all of your communities in CCA, either online or in hard copy. We want to thank you all for your deliberations and the CCA web geniuses who posted all the results on the CCA website.

On the day before Thanksgiving a major snowstorm smashed through, dumping two feet of wet, heavy

snow on southern New Hampshire. Most of the city of Concord lost power.

On generator power, we cooked our Thanksgiving Dinner with one stove, eating more simply than we might have. It was a day to pray for others not



blessed with a generator. On Friday we read with relief of various people's solutions to cooking the Dinner and of the shelters that were opened. Restaurants also opened their doors to people in need. Here at home, Sisters Miryam, Susan, and Hilary spent much of Thanksgiving afternoon helping trees and bushes out of the ice, sawing off broken

We had a festive Christmas, followed by a celebration of Ephiphany, on which we chose St. Teresa Benedicta as our patron for the second year in a row. Her picture remains in our refectory and something of her presence also as we share our common meals. On the Feast of the Baptism, we choose countries to pray for during the coming year. On this Feast, Sr. Miryam consulted a site called Open Doors U.S.A. (http://www.opendoorsusa.org).

This site tracks countries that persecute Christians, providing a sheet with a map, a description of the government, and an account of the intensity of persecution for each country. We have a firmer basis for our prayer plus a go-to site when we need to update our information. During Recreation we drew sheets, passed them around and shared.

Ahead of us lie choices about the Year of Consecrated Life and our celebrations of Our Holy Mother's 500th Birthday. Our STJ events include a workshop on St. Teresa in May by Sr. Hilary and a special triduum, October 13-15, evening Masses with Fr. Mark Joseph DeVelis, O.C.D. We will keep you informed about these and other events in coming issues. Blessings to all as winter continues.

In the beginning of October our Diocese was shaken by the death of our Delegate for Religious. Fr. Bill Wiethorn, a Capuchin friar, was a supportive

friend and companion to the religious communities in our diocese. In mid-September he was diagnosed with pneumonia, and subsequent tests revealed he had untreatable cancer. He witnessed such confidence in God's tremendous love and was at peace in knowing that God would bring him home. Fr. Bill's journey was a profound lesson in how to approach and accept the realities of our human existence and come to a place of deep peace and surrender knowing we are embraced by the love of God.

On the coat tails of sorrow we were uplifted by many joyous events. On October 11, Vera Lea celebrated her 80th birthday. Patty Thornhill, her sister, came up from Columbus to celebrate with her. Patty treated the community to Thai cuisine from a local top notch restaurant and topped it out with napoleons that you would die for. Vera Lea was thrilled that she could enjoy her all-time favorites on this milestone occasion.

God provides in many ways that are surprising and unexpected. Those who schedule priests for Masses would enjoy this story. Our Sister Jean Marie is always on the lookout for priests to preside over liturgy. Fr. Don Cozzens, a frequent celebrant, suggested that Jean Marie contact Archbishop Michael Fitzgerald who is spending the academic year at John Carroll University. Archbishop Michael was named Nuncio of Egypt from 2006 until 2011. We have been blessed by his gracious spirit and wonderful pastoral presence. When we were in need during Christmas week, Auxiliary Bishop Emeritus Roger Gries came to pinch hit for us. Bishop Gries has preached our Therese Novena Liturgy and is a steadfast friend to our community.

As a rule I take a pencil and several pieces of paper to liturgy when Father Michael Woost presides; the Feast of Holy Mother was no exception. Mike gave a tremendous homily focusing on how we can enter this year of celebration for the 5th centenary of the birth of Saint Teresa of Jesus. Mike made reference to Volume II of the Letters of Holy Mother, Letter # 449 article 4 written to Sister Leonor de la Misericordia: "I praise you, for interiorly you are advancing in the practice of virtue. Leave your soul to God; it is his spouse. He will be responsible for it and lead it to the place that most suits it." Fr. Mike's focus was to encourage us not only to grow in prayer and contemplation but also to strive to grow in virtue. If we do not, we run the risk of being spiritual dwarfs. Entrusting ourselves into God's care and allowing God to take us to a deeper place indeed cultivate the flowering of virtues in our lives.

One of the unforeseen maintenance projects that had to be addressed during this time was the reconstruction of our screened-in porch. We were informed by a carpenter who was performing some repair work around that monastery that on close examination the wood supports on the outside porch were rotting away. We were told that sisters could no longer sit on the porch because of the possibility of collapse. At the end of October carpenters came to shore up the structure until proper reconstruction could occur. They finished the job in November, so all is well in that department.

Bernadette is usually scurrying around with the tractor and mowers getting the yard in shape for the annual leaf rake. Students from Gilmour Academy and John Carroll University came to help her in this labor intensive adventure. We were all prepared to feed the crowds and work up a sweat when to our amazement 7 inches of snow fell. Bernadette had to cancel our 19th Annual Leaf Rake. We did have a lovely consolation prize that day: we shared lunch with Pat Giralt, a Secular Order member, and her children, who had driven up from Akron, only 20 miles away; they had no snow!

And we received generous food collections from two different groups at Thanksgiving this year so have been able to share with our parish pantry, as well as help a former neighbor who depends on our help.

. *The monastery:* The work in our third floor, i.e. the new prayer room, sewing room, and copy room, is finished but for the adjusting of the shutters and laying of some carpet in the prayer room. The architect suggested "a blue or green rug, something cool." We had to tell him we had already chosen the color, "Bonfire." The work in the choir is quite another story, left untold for the present.

We have an archivist coming three days a week to work on our archives. She is a recent graduate working under the supervision of a more experienced woman who comes frequently to check how things are progressing.

Liturgy and Retreats: Our retreat in October was given by Fr. Frank Conroy, a diocesan priest whom we have know for some time. An excellent homilist, he is very insightful and practical.

And before her fall, Eileen Mary went down to Barrington for her retreat which she greatly appreciated, not knowing at the time what lay ahead.

A Korean friend of Sr. Agnes, who is studying at BC, Fr. Damian, OFM, and Fr. Francis SJ, a Filipino, studying here also, came to celebrate Mass with us. Fr. Bill Murphy, a spiritual director at John XIII seminary, has started to come regularly.

One day we had a call from a Fr. John Cappucci who asked if he could come for the feast of OHM. He did, bringing guests and two cases of wine. He said he was friendly with the sisters in Covington Carmel and would bring them wine on OHM's feast. However, when he retuned for Mass in ordinary time he brought wine with him again. He told us of an incident that occurred while he was in Louisiana. He had been given the promise of two tickets to the '04 Superbowl game, and after some serious urging, he convinced a friend to fly down from Boston for the game, only to have the promise of tickets fall through. He 'desperately' needed two tickets and turned to his fiends at Covington Carmel who promised to start praying immediately. The following day someone from St. Louis gave him two free tickets. And the Patriots beat St. Louis in their first Superbowl.

Formation/education We continue our weekly sharing on OHM's letters, and our one on one meetings at Sunday lunch.

We postponed two of the Inter-community classes due to the weather and the fact that two of our community were still in rehabs.

Sr. Marian came up from Barrington for one day of class on the updated history of Carmel in Mexico and the US. She has promised to return. And on the day this report is due Randy Sachs SJ will be giving us input on the Incarnation.

Prayers Sr. Agnes' mother had a serious stroke. Sister went to Korea for a week in October and was able to give some assistance to her sister in visiting. Mrs. Ahn is coming on but prayer would be appreciated.

Sr. Marieleth's mother in the Philippines is also having serious health problems. Please pray for her. On Nov. 22, during supper dishes, Eileen Mary tripped and fell. At first she believed she was OK, but when she experienced severe pain during the night she ended up in the hospital emergency room with Bernadette Therese. The blood thinner she was taking caused much blood to flow to the knee and complications followed. On Thanksgiving day the community went in two groups to be with Sister. After thanksgiving she went from the hospital to the rehab at Marian Manor. Just before Christmas she went back to the hospital where they removed the 'dead blood." Three of us spent time with her on Christmas. She joined us for the day on Epiphany and then returned to Marian Manor. Our hopes -and hers, are to have her back with us during this month.

After her knee replacement, Mary Teresa went to the rehab in NY with which her sister's community is affiliated

and looked up at the monastery then lay down at the front gate and made a snow angel before continuing on.

Later we had more snow, a goodly bit. Richard, the

Having a place to park for those coming to the monastery each day becomes a challenge in the winter. We've toyed with several ideas, some more aggressive than others, to protect the spaces we had cleared from the marauding hordes (of new neighbors, young able fellows quite capable of shoveling out their own driveways). We have yet to solve the problem, but we intend to.

In November Sr. Chris Wood, O.P., from Grand Rapids, MI, visited us as a consultant from NRRO (National Religious Retirement Office) for a few days. This service of observation and advice while sharing the daily living of the community is connected to the possibility of receiving a grant from the organization for the community's needs. Sister fit right in. It reminded me of what one of the Dominican priests who comes to us for Mass remarked once: "Dominicans are close in spirit to the Carmelites."

The annual concert presented by the Cathedral Choir for our benefit was well attended. They are very generous with their time and talent. These past two years we changed the schedule from a late evening hour to the afternoon so people could avoid night driving. The chapel was full; everyone appreciates the beauty of the music and the enthusiasm and humor of Msgr. Anthony Mancini, the conductor.


