

Our present day news is filled with ISIS, Boko Haram and AL Qaeda but memory can powerfully evoke our past. A memorial held in our chapel brought the remembrance of World War II, the young who died and whose sacrifice prevailed in bringing peace. On May 4, surviving Crew members of the USS Morrison DD-5560 and their families gathered on the 70th Anniversary, the actual day of a Kamikaze attack, which sank the Destroter. The young sailors, who survived, have gathered over the past seventy years to pay tribute to the 153 who died.



On Thursday, April 16, Fr. Bob Chorey, Sister Claire, Sister Maria and a young friend, Paige Depolo spoke to three senior Classes at our local Catholic high school. Basing our talks on "we are all called by Baptism" we told the stories which led us to Priesthood and consecrated religious life. Paige spoke from the perspective of someone who has attended a secular University and grew in her faith. For many of the students Paige's talk was perhaps more relevant as a very high percentage are not attending a Catholic institution.

Over the past few years there has been a continuing exodus of Religious from Northern Nevada, due to shrinking numbers and the needs of their Congregations elsewhere. So many Sisters have gone that our Monastery remains as the only group with a real property left in the diocese. With this perspective, we have truly welcomed a new group, the Holy Family Sisters of the Needy, a Religious Institute founded in the Catholic Archdiocese of Owerri, Imo State, Nigeria in 1983 for the alleviation of the hopeless human condition of the poor and needy of our society. Their apostolate has a fourfold purpose:

· Care of orphans, abandoned children; physically and mentally challenged children;

- · Care of teenage unmarried pregnant girls and their babies, street and abused girls; girls in difficult situations.
- · Care of poor homeless old men and women;
- · Care of the destitute and the marginalized.

The spirituality of this Religious Order is modeled on that of St. Therese of Lisieux - the Little Way of St. Therese exemplified in love, simplicity of life and childlike confidence in God. They have come to Nevada to begin an apostolate to Families caring for people with Alzheimer's disease.

New opportunities and challenges surfaced rapidly for us in the initial months of 2015. The community was quite excited to read the communication sent by the Leadership team regarding the proposal for the establishment of an international commission of nuns. We gathered to discuss that question, and we were all on board to support such an effort. Even the exploration and the possibility of serious discussion of the topic were seen as coinciding with the goals of CCA. Our sisters agreed that it was a milestone event for women in

Carmel. Our kudos go to Claire for representing the nuns of the United States at the General Chapter in Avila. We greatly appreciated her report and sensed that the Holy Spirit was working among all councils of the four associations. The first verse of "Sing a New Church" expresses our hope in the future: "Summoned by the God who made us rich in our diversity, gathered in the name of Jesus, richer still in unity." There is great realization that collaboration of this caliber does not come just by good intention and wishful thinking, but rather by a commitment to claiming the essentials in our life and respecting the spectrum of expressions in Carmel. We send our prayerful support to all the members of our Leadership team for their dedication and hard work at this historic moment.

On the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes we were privileged to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick within the Eucharistic Liturgy. Father Michael McCandless utilized Pope Francis' talk on World Day of Prayer for the Sick. The members of our daily worshipping community appreciated the opportunity of experiencing the reception of both sacraments.

We shall never forget the winter of 2015. The thermometer plummeted and took consistent dives in the sub-zero region. Our eyes almost leaped out of our sockets when we peered outside and saw the temperature register at -11°. Winter storms plagued us for weeks, and schools were closed for a record number of days because of severe cold and wind chill.

March took on a brighter note as several sisters participated in the lecture series, "Praise the Name of the Lord: Meditations on the Beautiful Names of God" given by Archbishop Michael L. Fitzgerald. One of the highlights that they experienced was the chanting of the Beautiful Names of God in Arabic. It was a source of enlightenment as we seek to foster greater understanding between diverse cultures and religions. All of the sisters celebrated Saint Patrick's Day with flair. We joined Patricia Conway and Patricia O'Brien in honoring the great saint of the isle. A Slovenian lassie (Bernadette) baked delicious Irish Soda bread while another colleen of Italian ancestry (Maria) cooked a robust corned beef and cabbage meal that could rival the best! We did not feel the cadence of thunderous Celtic drumming that day, but we did encounter some mighty surprising happenings on our property. Sixty-six feet of our enclosure wall collapsed sometime during the day. At evening liturgy we were amazed that we could see lights from our neighbor's windows as we peered through the large chapel window facing the meditation garden. Something in our environment had changed! The next morning we could see the damage. Because of the severe weather and shifting ground a portion of the wall came tumbling down. We were astonished that no one in the community heard noise from the incident. On the feast of Saint Joseph the insurance adjustor came to evaluate the situation and walked around the property. Along with the insurance adjustor came a group of deer to investigate unexplored territory burgeoning with new spring growth.

On receiving the communication from Father Saverio, the community decided to hold our day of prayer for peace on Thursday, March 26. It was a gift and blessing for us to realize that Pope Francis was also participating in this Carmelite world-wide prayer initiative. Barb invited members of our worshipping community to join us for this time of communal silent prayer after our morning liturgy. It truly was an experience of solidarity as we united our prayer with all the members of the order and those who come to join us in our daily worship.

Father Michael Woost presided over our special liturgy in honoring Our Holy Mother on her birthday, March 28. We used the texts from the votive mass for Saint Teresa. The excerpt from the book of Wisdom exemplified Teresa's life as she prayed for wisdom in seeking out the ability to be God's friend. It was after her second conversion that she began to value her relationship with God above all else. Teresa invites us to join her in that venture to allow God to form and fashion us and to believe that all things are possible with God's help. In the *Meditations on the Song of Songs* (6.1), Teresa writes:

But our most sacred King has still much to give. He would never want to do anything else than give if He could find receivers. And as I have said often – I want you never to forget, daughters – the Lord is never content with giving us as little as we desire; I have seen it here.

Mike ended his homily by encouraging us not to put limits on God because there is still so much God wants to give us.

Germaine Corbin, CCVI, a long time friend of the community, traveled from San Antonio to make her retreat at the Jesuit Retreat House in Parma and added extra days for a long-awaited visit with our community. Germaine was with us for three years during the 70's and has remained a steadfast friend. She was grateful for her time here at the monastery and her visits with Anita, Mary, and Anne Joan at Regina Health Center. We were thrilled that Germaine was one of the readers of the Passion Narrative at our Palm Sunday Liturgy.

Archbishop Michael L. Fitzgerald was our presider for the Sacred Triduum. It was a deeply moving experience to witness the mandatum as he washed the feet of those participating in the sacred ritual. He appreciated Bernadette's expertise in starting our Easter fire since we had to hold the preliminary rites in the front office of the monastery. The Archbishop had a resonant voice that sustained a solo chant of the Exultet. At a later date he told us that he enjoyed singing in an ecumenical choir near his mission in Jerusalem.

Father Don Cozzens was celebrant for our Easter Sunday Liturgy. He used the last stanza of the Benedictus to convey the Easter theme of life resurrecting from the darkness. We were truly

blessed to have such wonderful paschal celebrations.

During Eastertide, Don brought 20 students from John Carroll University to learn about contemplative life within the teresian charism. Barb had a good session with them and entertained many excellent questions concerning prayer and our life together in Carmel.

On Monday, April 13, Barb received a call that Anita was being transported to Charity Hospital ER for an apparent intestinal blockage and heart difficulties. Anita was not eating well for several days and the staff was worried that something major was transpiring. After testing and some time in the ICU, it was determined that she should return to Regina Health Center and be placed in hospice care. Barb received a call from the nursing staff on Thursday indicating that Anita was not doing well. When we visited Anita, she was able to respond and talk so that we could actually hear her conversation. Anita's brother Robert, sister-in-law Kay, and nieces Julie and Lisa came on Friday, and we visited on Saturday. On Sunday morning Barb received a call that Anita was very low. We all returned to Regina Health Center on Sunday, surrounding Anita with prayer, recitation of Scripture, and song. On Sunday, April 19, at 6:22 pm Anita went peacefully home to her loving God.

One of the endearing titles that we used to describe Anita was, "The Evangelizer of Fairmount Boulevard." She had a loving, cheerful, hospitable nature that welcomed everyone so that many of our neighbors came to worship with us for Sunday Liturgy. That peacefilled, contented spirit endured as she became a resident of the Saint Angela Center at the Ursuline Motherhouse and then at Regina Health Center sponsored by the Sisters of Charity of Saint Augustine. A lovely woman who had visited Anita weekly remarked that Anita had taught her so much during the two years of their friendship. Leslie stood by Anita's bedside for two days as we kept vigil. One of the staff at Regina (a 40 minute drive from the monastery) drove around the Cleveland Heights area for two hours attempting to find the monastery to attend the wake. When Debbie finally appeared, she exclaimed, "I had to come because I loved Sister Anita!" Anita kept evangelizing until her time to enter the glory of the Lord. What a treasured legacy we have been given.

Thomas Merton, Anita's Spiritual Director and friend of the Wasserman family, wrote to her on the occasion of her profession in Carmel:

I was happy to hear that your profession is to be on Ascension day... It teaches us to live in

heaven. Our desires must be where our true rest is found. . . And being in heaven does not mean escaping from our poor limitations and littleness: it means learning to find heaven with our own littleness. Jesus emptied Himself in order to teach us this. We do not have to be great but simply to be ourselves—the selves whom He loved. And so, when you make your vows, do not think you cease to be Ann. The closer we come to God, the more we begin to be the person we have always been. (May 8, 1954)

As spring came upon us, our Saint Ignatius Alumni Group manned the lawn movers, rakes, and clippers to help spruce up the place to get ready for the planting season. With such a harsh winter and the damage from ice melt, the slate floor in our Chapel needed to be cleaned and resealed. We celebrated Liturgy in our basement Guild Room during the restoration process. We enjoyed roughing it; however, we were grateful to get back to the Chapel.

On May 4, the Carmelite Guild had a special farewell for Father Lorn Snow, SJ. Lorn has been chaplain to the Guild for many years and was pastor of Gesu near John Carroll University. He has been assigned to Saint John's Parish at Creighton University, Omaha, Nebraska.

FORMATION The ICFP lecturers this semester were all from the Boston College School of Theology and Ministry. One exception, however was Fr. Leonard Copeland OCD, who came from Brighton to bring our year to a close with some excellent talks on Mary. Fr. Richard Lennan, spoke on Pope Francis' "Joy of the Gospel," Richard Clifford SJ, on Qoheleth and 'God's Love in Deuteronomy.' Andre Brouillette SJ, on 'OHM and Salvation,' and Robert Daly SJ, on the liturgy. In an interesting note, Fr. Daly told us that there is an ancient Eucharistic rite used in eastern Syria and recognized by Rome, that does not have any words of consecration included in the Mass prayers. New to our roster of speakers was Nicholas King SJ, a professor at Oxford who's been visiting at BC, and who has done a translation of the entire Bible from the Greek. He spoke on the Gospel of Mark, giving it a new luster and giving us a perspective that heightened the role of Mark's Gospel significantly. Not least was his manner of presentation, which we thoroughly enjoyed. He

will, however, be leaving BC at the end of the semester as he's wanted back in Oxford. Andrew Davis, a layman teaching at BC, spoke on 'Isaiah in the Liturgy' and 'Women in Genesis.' He mentioned that the word 'Carmel' is very old, most probably from the Canaanite language. Though so many of the place names in Israel have been changed from one language to another and changed again, 'Carmel' has remained the same. (A book by Jo Robertson that is quite good on the subject is "Contested Land, Contested Memory: Israel's lews and Arabs and the Ghosts of Catastrophe".)

---A Jordanian woman whom we met through a friend, came to speak with us about the political situation in her country as she has experienced it. We were impressed by her very Christian spirit and grateful for her visit.

GIFTS Fr. Carney Gavin, who died recently, left behind many unique chalices, vestments, religious articles, and books which his friends brought to the monastery, offering us whatever we felt we could use. As it happened, there had been a fire in the village in South Sudan where our friend Richard, the seminarian, comes from and the parishes there have been left with little. We had some of Carney's chalices replated and were able to give them, as well as some vestments, to Richard for the parish churches of his village.

NEIGHBORHOOD After a lapse of some time, the Jesus Caritas group of priests, who live and work in the area, have started meeting at the monastery on a regular basis once again. ---And, as I'm sure you have all heard by now, we had nine feet, two inches of snow. In one neighborhood, a man built a 4-room igloo that was twelve feet in height. It's all gone now, the igloo and the snow. We finally gave up the parking-space fight and decided that next year we'd not shovel any of the street, but bring the cars of our Mass celebrants and workers inside. In front of the monastery we have a long stretch of sidewalk, three-fourths of which had been shoveled. Unfortunately we ended up being fined for the section that wasn't. The fine, however, turned out to be less than the cost of shoveling.

We cannot help imagining the many conversations she is having now with her friend Sr. Ignatius. In her deeply moving reflections during the Mass of Resurrection, Sr. Colette pointed out how much Sr. Marie Therese was concerned for the emotional and physical wellbeing of others:

"On Sunday, May 3rd, as our beloved sister, Marie Therese, lay dying at Stella Maris, we listened to the beautiful reading from Revelation, chapter 21, during our prayer service for Baltimore City. God says: *Now I am making all things new, the whole of creation new... I will give water from the well of life free to anyone who is thirsty; it is the rightful inheritance of the one who proves victorious... I will be her God and she a daughter to me (Rev. 21: 5-8). These words hold the hope and beauty of Sr. Marie Therese's fidelity and the mission to which she was committed, heart and soul. She understood this promise as contemplative wisdom: her desire for God and God's desire for her and her passionate love for all God's people. Now in the Easter season of our 225th anniversary and during the birthday year of the great St. Teresa, she has made the journey to resurrected life and her God's eternal embrace. If we had ever suggested such a significant and favorable passage, Marie Therese would have responded with her droll chuckle and bright eyes. But she has left us in this anniversary year of foundation, joining a host of Baltimore Carmelites in heaven, becoming an "agent of God's love" in a new, creative way and, no doubt like her namesake St Therese of Lisieux, will spend her heaven doing good upon earth.*

The changes that came with Vatican II were a challenge for her as were some of the changes inaugurated by the community. She kept to some traditions but, in other ways, like her friend, Sr. Ignatius she was ahead of her time, or, maybe, outside of time. Marie Therese had a heart that ached for the poor and she herself chose to live as simply as possible. But, alongside her prayer, she found ways to assist the disadvantaged, the

marginalized and honor God's creation. She spent hours helping folks on the phone and those who came to the monastery door. She befriended and helped the family who then lived across the road, caretakers at the big Meadowcroft house, especially when one of the

young daughters became pregnant. She incorporated Al, a relatively homeless man, into our regular mealtimes. She gathered fruit from our exhausted apple trees and crabapple trees, turning it into homemade applesauce and jelly. Long before Pope Francis she understood the church as a "field hospital" and was impelled to care for God's people and God's earth in the most practical ways."

Consecrated Life Retreat



May 23 the Louisville members of the Association of Contemplative Sisters hosted a

Cluster meeting at Bellarmine University in Louisville. We joined some 300 people who came to celebrate the Centennial of the birth of Thomas Merton. Bellarmine houses hundreds of his manuscripts, drawings and artifacts. There have been speakers and exhibits there since January 31. The keynote lecture was "After Christendom," by Dr. Charles Taylor, Professor Emeritus of Philosophy, McGill University, Montreal, and winner of the 2007 Templeton Prize. He spoke of a number of things that he felt would mark the future of Christianity as a religion, things that marked the life of Merton. Faith would be more of a journey, he said, rather than emphasis on dogma. Doubt would play a role, not threatening, but keeping one open to newness (or as Pope Francis would put it, the surprises of God). The defensive barriers between religions would increasingly give way to friendly sharing and encouragement. I thought of Teilhard de Chardin's saying that "All that rises will converge." We had dinner as a group. Our only disappointment was that Cynthia Bourgeault was a responder to this talk and was going to share with us at this time. Due to a last minute health emergency, she was unable to come.

For ongoing formation, we have finished a series of lectures by Fr. Richard Lennan, a Professor of Systematic Theology at Boston College and an expert on Karl Rahner. His lectures were titled, "Karl Rahner, Theologian of Grace." These lectures left us each time in deep silence. The final lecture was on "Hope and Prayer." Its' essential message of trust in the mystery of God at the heart of life, is so helpful to our living in a world marked by so much violence, both in humans and in nature. "The community of hope," he said, "is able to engage creatively in the present while leaving the outcome of present endeavors to God."

Our next endeavor is a series of lectures by Sr. Kathleen Deignan, a board member of the American Teilhard Association. It is a retreat on "The Divine Milieu" that promises to nurture our cosmic contemplation and deepen our life with Christ.

St. Mary of Jesus Crucified

We were able to see our Sisters of Bethlehem Carmel on facebook as they gathered to say good-bye to their three sisters going to Rome for the canonization of Sr. Mary of Jesus Crucified. They were singing and dancing in a circle along with the people of Bethlehem who were traveling with them and the seminarians of the Betharram Fathers. The Betharram Fathers in southern France were chaplains for the Carmel of Pau. When Berthe de St. Cricq Dartigaux generously offered to build Bethlehem Carmel she bought a large property on a hill in Bethlehem. Alongside the Carmel another big convent was built for the Betharram Fathers so they could be chaplains for the nuns. On the Jerusalem Patriarchate web-site we saw Bishop Shomali and heard his words of joy. As I recall, he did not use the word saint, but spoke of Mariam as a righteous person - so scriptural and contemporary. Bishop Shomali's sister, May, lives in Baltimore, MD; she and Sr. Eileen went to the same school when growing up in Bethlehem.

Mother Alphonsine was canonized on the same day as Mary of Jesus Crucified; the two of them had met in life in Bethlehem. She had initially belonged to the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Apparition. Her Order, the Congregation of the Rosary, was started specifically for Arab women so they could remain in Palestine and serve; parents found it difficult for their children to leave for Europe. Now they are in many countries of the Arab world. It was only after her death that people discovered Alphonsine was the recipient of Mary's graces and the Foundress of the

order. Her blood sister, also a member of the order, was stunned to learn the truth and realized why Alphonsine was so full of the spirit of the order!
