"Wind blow free, move tenderly, source of our life and our being, gift from above, indwelling love, living stream flowing forever." The lyrics and melody of Mary Lavin's song, "Wind Blow Free," carried us through our days of

preparation and celebration for the Solemnity of Pentecost. Father Bernie McAniff, SJ, encouraged us to see Pentecost as a liberating future that God has promised and will give us, that for us as Church we are invited to stand free and hopeful in a world gone fearful. What a daring prospect for the Church to be dreaming! What a singular invitation for us as Carmelites as we stand on the shoulders of so many women who have gone before us in faith and as we celebrate the dynamism of our Holy Mother Saint Teresa in this Fifth Centenary of her birth!

It seemed as though we were being showered by God's graces as we moved forward through the summer months. Father Marc Foley, OCD, facilitated our retreat and gave us conferences focusing on *The Life* by Holy Mother Teresa. Marc masterfully broadened and deepened our understanding of Teresa and the complexities that surrounded her as a woman of the 16th century. We were given additional kernels of wisdom to take on our journey from Marc's daily homilies. He gave us poignant survival instructions to place in our backpacks as we venture on the path of Carmel situated in the reality of the joys and sorrows of daily life. We were blessed to have such insightful input during this special time of celebration for our Order.

In June Mary K. Keklak travelled to Arlington Cemetery to attend a Memorial Mass for her brother Michael, who passed away in December. Her family came from all parts of the country to gather and celebrate her brother's life. Michael had been a member of the U.S. Coast Guard in his earlier days and had recently resided in the V.A. Nursing Facility in Montrose, NY.

For those of you who remember our entries from past newsletters you may recall our problem with heavy rains and basement flooding. The day before retreat, the rains came, and the winds blew, and the basement flooded. We now know that Barb, Bernadette, Donna, and Maria could head up a disaster clean-up corporation! We had our annual vacation week in August, which involves some sort of excursion. This year we drove back to Indianapolis to visit our old monastery and see the latest renovations that have made it more comfortable and user friendly for an expanding number of seminarians. The current number is forty-six, twice the number of Carmelites ever to inhabit this medieval looking dwelling at one time. They have added a beautiful dining room, complete with a large

fireplace. On the south end of the lower corridor there is an additional wing with ten double rooms and two for the seminary staff. The rector, Fr. Bob Robeson, made us feel very much at home as we checked out places that hold so many memories. His efforts to preserve the beauty of the original architecture are commendable.

Some twenty years ago we held a CCA meeting at the former Redemptorist monastery in upstate New York. On the free afternoon we drove to the Culinary Institute of America. Pierre Teilhard de Chardin is buried in the old cemetery there and that was the object of our visit. It was so moving to stand by his simple, unadorned grave. We called it our Teilhard tree. What a joy to see it standing tall and beautiful just where we placed it.

We were happily surprised when he got up from the table and poured the second round of coffee! He told us that he grew up with many sisters and he knew how to obey orders! The last weekend of our annual 9 day retreat in preparation for Pentecost was somewhat disrupted by the presence of the Navy's The Blue Angels Precision Flying Team, which was in Latrobe for an Air Show which occurred June 7th and 8th with practice on the 5th and 6th. Our Monastery is directly in line with the main runway of the airport, when landing they come over our property at about tree top level. Of course the noise that accompanies their performance is not really conducive to prayer. But the stunts and formation flying are spectacular to watch.

On June 10th we had a combination Pentecost Recreation Day and 53rd Foundation Day celebration. Since it was Tuesday, our Mass was broadcast over WAOB allowing us to very publicly express our gratitude to all those in the area who have and continue to support us in our way of life. At Recreation the three sisters, who came on the foundation, shared stories about the early days here in Latrobe.

July 4th fell on First Friday this year so the community decided to have our picnic and celebration on the 3rd and offer our customary First Friday Exposition Day for the needs of our nation and a conversion back to reliance on God. We had many lay people join us for hours of adoration during the day.

For the Feast of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel at our morning Mass, Fr. Aaron Buzzell, OSB ended his homily with a story about a miracle attributed to OLMC in 1894, which was recognized by the Church in 1895. None of us had ever heard the story, which I relate below:

At the end of October 1894 in Palmi, Italy people began reporting strange eye movements and color changes on the face of the Statue of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. These changes continued for 17 days and on the evening of November 16th a procession was organized to carry the statue through the streets of city. When the procession reached the edge of the city a violent earthquake occurred which collapsed most of the houses in the area. Palmi had a population of about 15,000 people at the time but only nine were killed because nearly everyone participated in the procession. Each year on November 16 the statue of OLMC us carried through Palmi to commemorate this miracle.

Sr. Mary Paul did some research and found out that Palmi is located on the "Toe of the Boot" of Italy and that her father had been born there.

Srs. Marie Elizabeth, Mary, Mary Paul and Shirley made a visit to our sisters in Danville on July 24th. It was a beautiful day for traveling, temperature in the 70's, sunshine, and a lovely breeze. We received a very warm welcome from our sisters. They had arranged for Srs. Therese and Anna to be transported from the extended care facility in time to join us for a late lunch in the cafeteria. Plans had been made to have Sr. Ann Marie also join us but that did not work out so we missed seeing her. During the afternoon we spent time catching up and sharing.

I have mentioned in past newsletters that we were assembling "relic cards" of Bl. Karl for Br. Nathan who is the US/Canadian delegate for his cause. We were shocked when, on July 30th at the end of Mass, our chaplain asked us to pray for Br. Nathan, who had passed away at 1:30 that morning from a burst aneurism in the stomach. He was only 57.

Fr. Jude returned on Wednesday, July 13^{th} , to preside at our election. Sr. Mary Wild was elected prioress. We moved to the Chapel for the Confirmation Ceremony. Then, with Sr. Mary presiding we elected the councilors – 1^{st} Sr. Joann, 2^{nd} Sr. Marie Elizabeth, and 3^{rd} Sr. Mary Paul. We returned to the Chapel for a community picture with Fr. Jude and pictures of the new Council. Following the elections, Fr. Jude was also our celebrant for our titular feast, the Solemnity of Mary's Assumption. We were able to surprise Sr. Marie Elizabeth with a special dinner to thank her for her service these past 3 years.

Carmel of Our Lady and St. Joseph Concord, New Hampshire

"How well I know the living spring that flows though it is night!"

On Saturday, September 13, 2014, Sr. Claudette celebrated her completion of 50 years of profession in Carmel. St. John of the Cross set the theme of Sr. Claudette's Golden Jubilee with his "Song of the Soul That Rejoices to Know God by Faith." Sr. Claudette herself desired that her liturgy emphasize "the theme of 'living water,' the life of the Holy Spirit within us."

Thus, the living spring, both in Scripture and in Carmelite literature, served as a powerful symbol for Sr. Claudette's liturgy and celebration. The first and third readings, "Oh come to the water, all you who are thirsty," (Isaiah, 55) and "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me and drink," (John 7) provided a framework for the reflections of the homily.

In his homily, Fr. Daniel Chowning, O.C.D. spoke profoundly of water as "one of St. Teresa's preferred symbols to speak of God's dynamic and creative life within us and our thirst for God." He brought out the mutuality of our relationship with God: God thirsts for our love even more deeply than we can thirst for his; it is God's loving thirst for us that is the source of the "living water" that he gives us; this living water is the life of the Holy Spirit, in which we share and for whom we thirst. 50 years of Carmelite life hold many ups and downs, many times of feeling dried up. Yet God does not abandon us but invites us every day to drink from the well of divine love who dwells within us, the Spirit of the living God. Fr. Daniel also reflected on the second reading from Romans: "So we do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day." Carmelite life is a life of deep transformation of the whole person "from one degree of glory to another, for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit."

Kevin Culligan, OCD, and many other priests also concelebrated. We were so blessed by all of them and by Claudette's family and the many friends of our community who attended—200 plus! Several sisters from the Carmels of Barrington and Baltimore also joined us. Although the weather was damp and windy, our hearts were not dampened at all. We partook of sandwiches and salads, Jubilee Cake, and hot coffee (cold pop and water if we did not feel the weather!) and we made a joyful noise. In the evening, the community hosted a catered dinner for Sr. Claudette and her extended family in our newly renovated refectory. Wonderful food—and no dishes! We were blessed by his wise homilies which connected Mary and the mystery of the Incarnation to our daily lives.

On July 17th, Sr. Teresa Susan Dreyer, O.C.D. began a three-year process of discernment with us. She serves as organist, gardener, and refectorian. Welcome, Teresa Susan!

In August, Sr. Claudette attended the celebration of the 500th anniversary of St. Teresa's birth in San Jose, CA. Before the celebration, she visited the Carmels of Santa Clara and Carmel. Then after the celebration, she spent more days at Santa Clara. We who stayed home really appreciated the live streaming of this celebration, which came through very clearly. We were moved, in fact awed, by the Virtual Choirs' elegant and beautiful performances of "Nada Te Turbe" and the Salve Regina. 


one of our sisters. It has been a fruitful experience for us to share on a text that is so familiar and meaningful to many of us.

We highly recommend it!

Our Reno community opened the Teresian year by inviting our friends to a special vespers celebration at the monastery.
